The Fatherhood-Family Initiative is a project of the Masonic Community Center Foundation in partnership with the Prince Hall Masons of Nebraska. The goal is to strengthen families by strengthening father-son relationships. The program is for boys from 4th grade through senior year in high school. There is a weekly father-son basketball session at the Jesuit Academy.

FFI was created to address the breakdown of the family, and specifically the decline of fatherhood and the father-son relationship. Why? Because no array of social programs can fix the problems produced by breakdown of the family unit,
