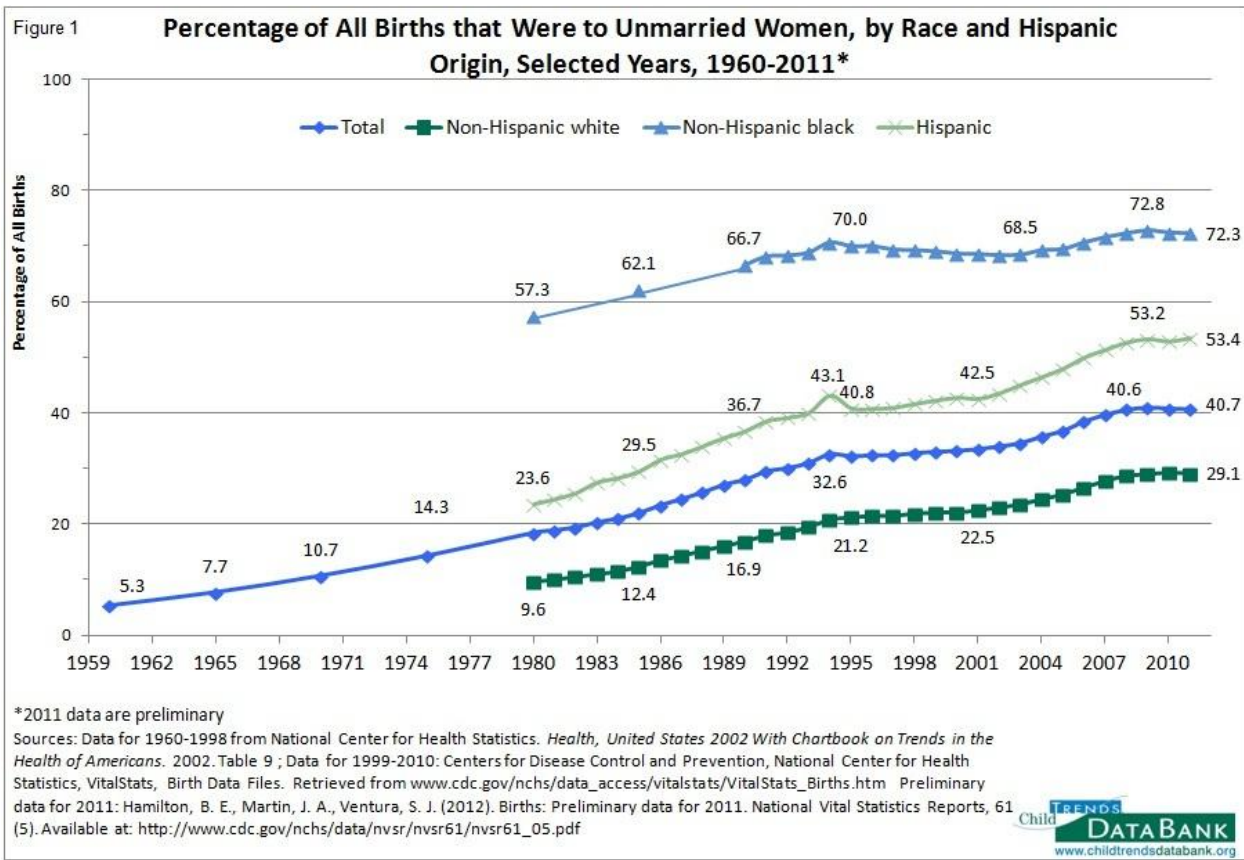
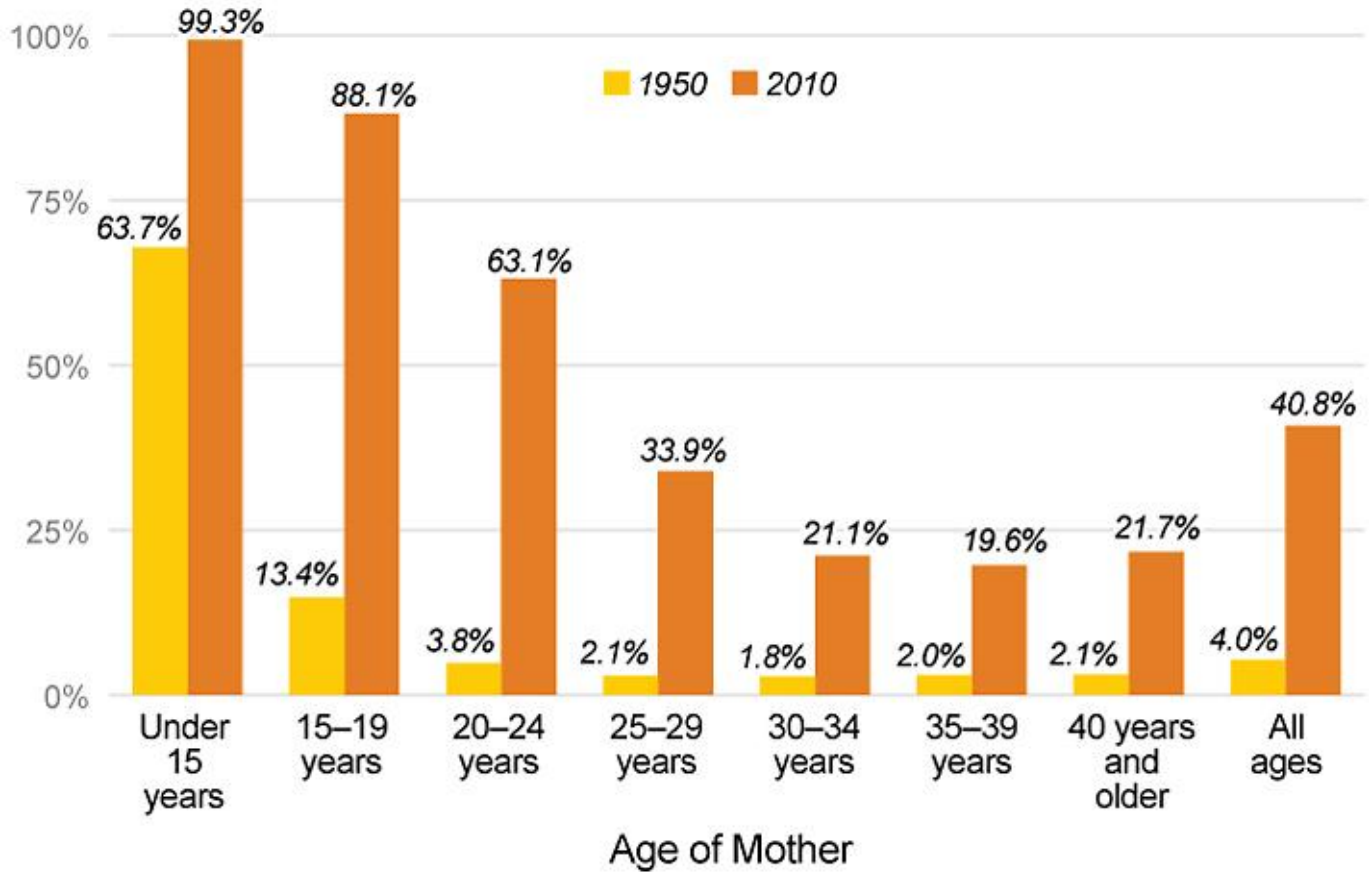

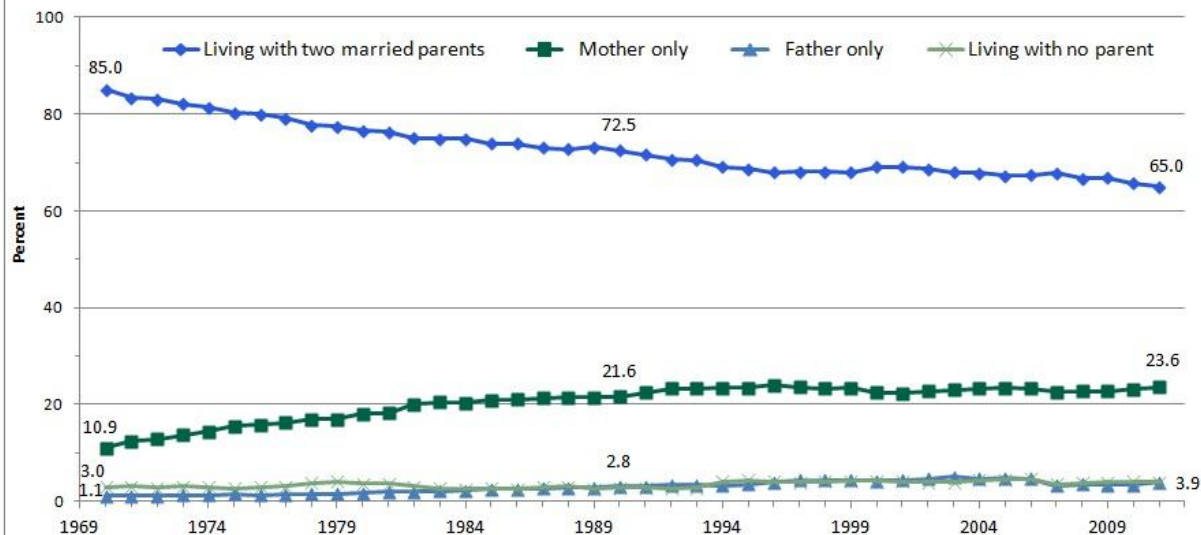

Living Arrangements of Children, 1970-2011

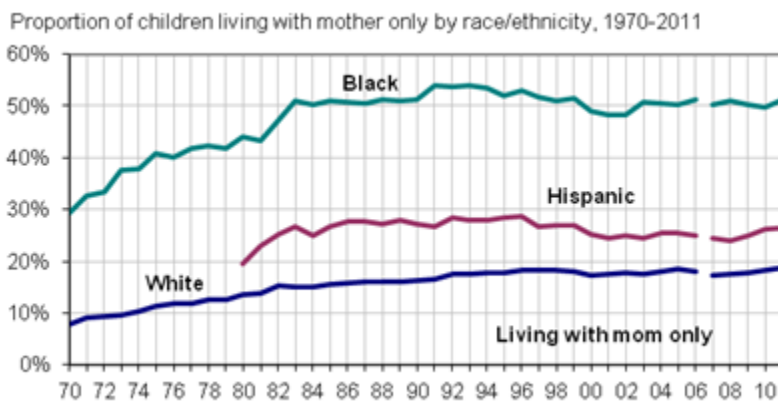
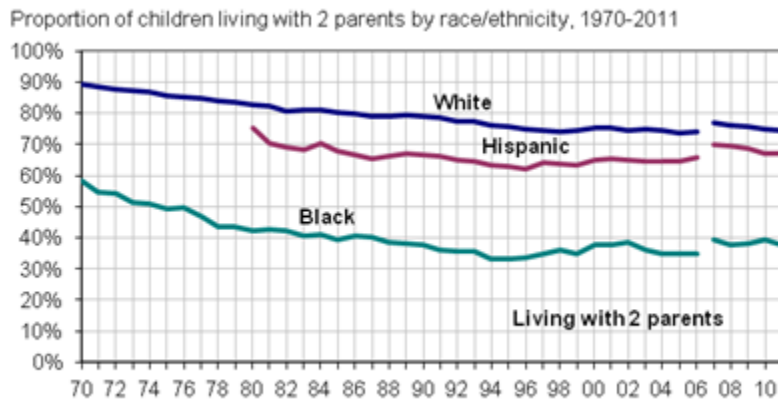

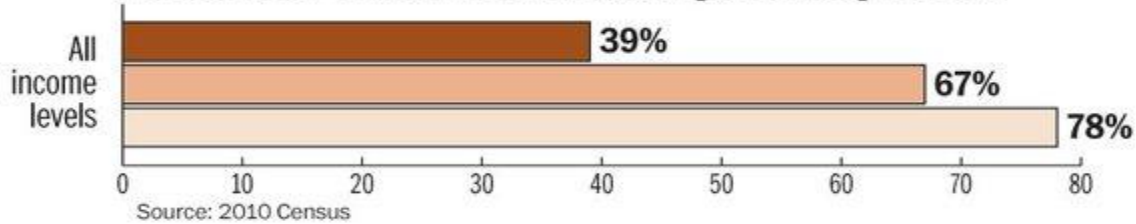

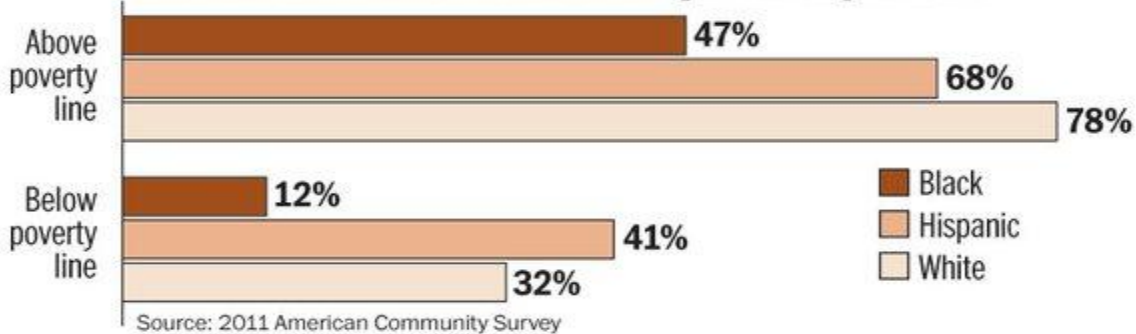
TWO-PARENT FAMILIES

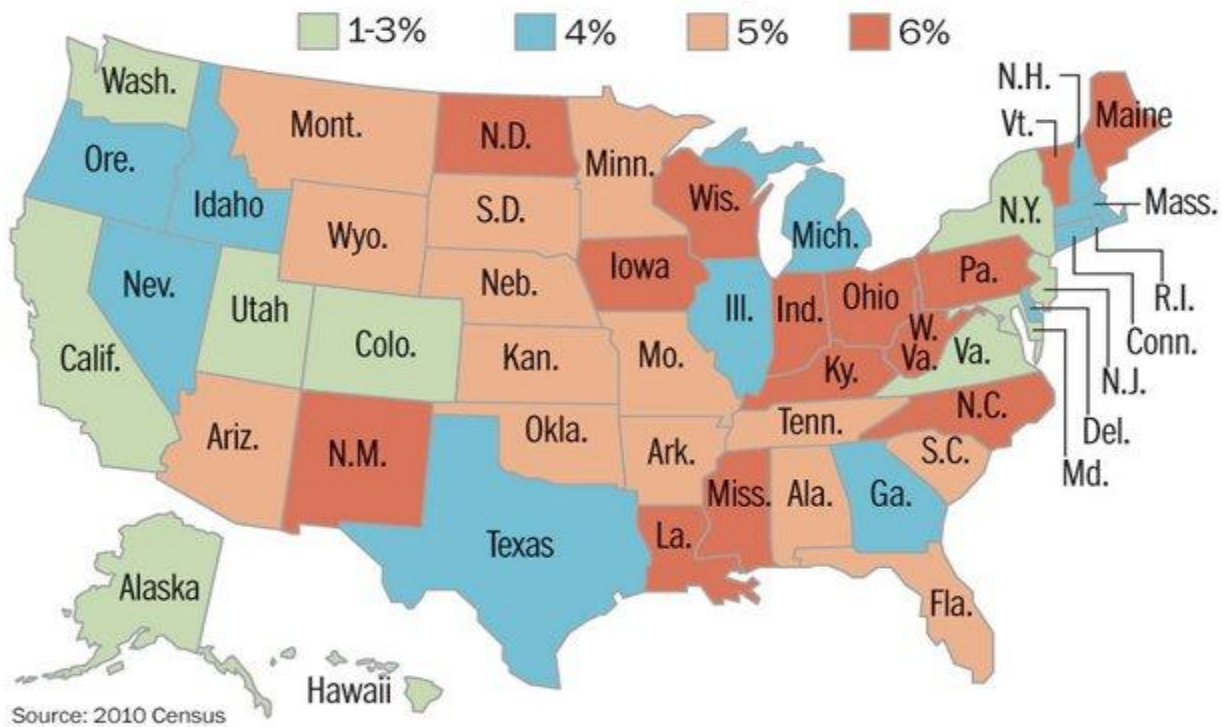
Percent of children with both parents present



Percent of families with both parents present



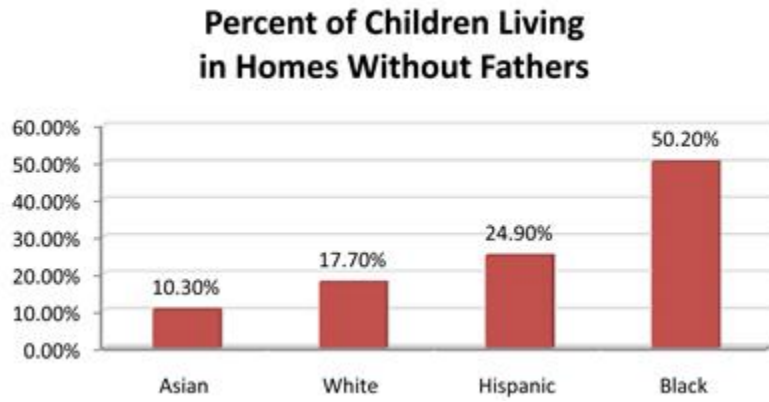
Percent decline in families with two parents, 2000-2010
